SOLIDARITY WITHOUT BORDERS: NIGERIAN AND UKRAINIAN RED CROSS DEEPEN HUMANITARIAN PARTNERSHIP



January opened on a powerful note of international solidarity as the Nigerian Red Cross Society (NRCS) welcomed a high-level delegation led by the Ukrainian Ambassador to Nigeria, Mr. Ivan Kholostenko, to its National Headquarters in Abuja.

The courtesy and partnership visit stood as a clear reminder that humanitarian action transcends borders, politics, and distance.

The delegation was received by the Secretary General of the Nigerian Red Cross Society, alongside members of the Society's senior leadership, including Directors of Disaster Management; Protection, Gender and Inclusion (PGI); Finance; Programs and Partnerships; Legal Services; Safer Access and Security, as well as the Chief Security Officer.

Their presence reflected the Society's unified leadership and readiness to strengthen global humanitarian collaboration.



Discussions during the visit focused on shared humanitarian priorities—ranging from disaster response and the protection of vulnerable populations to building community resilience and ensuring safer access for humanitarian workers operating in complex environments. In a strong expression of solidarity, the Ukrainian Red Cross reaffirmed its support for the work of NRCS, offering technical assistance and opportunities for knowledge exchange.

The visit concluded with a renewed commitment from both the Ukrainian and Nigerian Red Cross Societies to deepen collaboration, strengthen mutual support, and sustain dialogue in advancing humanitarian action. As the year begins, this engagement sets a clear tone for 2026: one rooted in partnership, shared responsibility, and a collective resolve to serve humanity wherever the need is greatest.

RESTORING DIGNITY, ONE MOTHER AT A TIME

Under the quiet Zamfara sun in Rijiya Ward, Gusau LGA, Nigeria, dignity arrived not as a speech or a promise, but as a simple hygiene kit placed gently into the hands of mothers who need it most.

On this day, the Nigerian Red Cross Society, Zamfara State team, reached out to pregnant women and lactating mothers under the Malnutrition Emergency Appeal Project, with the support of the International Federation of the Red Cross, IFRC. These were not just distributions they were moments of care, respect, and humanity in action.

The beneficiaries, members of the Mothers' Club, who gather weekly to learn, share, and support one another in the fight against malnutrition and poor maternal and child health, the kits symbolize more than relief items. They represent reassurance that they are seen, supported, and not alone.

Each dignity kit contains sanitary pads, pants, and a complete hygiene package including a jerry can, toothpaste, toothbrush, soap, and other essential items. Carefully selected, these materials protect personal hygiene, promote environmental sanitation, and restore a sense of dignity during one of the most vulnerable periods of a woman's life.

Presenting the items, the Branch Secretary, Instructor Ibrahim Bello Garba (Gusau), encouraged the mothers to continue cooperating with Red Cross volunteers who regularly visit households to identify children suffering from Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM). He also stresses the need to seek timely medical care by taking children to hospitals and health facilities whenever health concerns arise.



The community stands firmly behind the initiative as reiterated in a goodwill message by Shamsu Ahmad Yariman Rijiya, who represented the District Head of Rijiya. He restates his full cooperation and continued support for all Nigerian Red Cross activities within the community.

The activity was attended by key Branch officers who ensured that in Rijiya, dignity kits were not just distributed but dignity it is restored. And for every mother who walks away holding a kit, the message is clear: you matter, your health matters, and the Red Cross stands with you.

LIFESAVING INTERVENTION



Four Children, Four Communities, One Lifesaving Intervention

Across communities in Machina and Geidam Local Government Areas of Yobe State, malnutrition continues to threaten the health and survival of young children, often silently. Through the Malnutrition Emergency Appeal Project, the Nigerian Red Cross Society is changing this reality by taking lifesaving nutrition services directly to households and communities, ensuring that no child is left unseen.

During routine house-to-house and community nutrition screenings conducted by trained Red Cross volunteers, four children, each from different communities were identified with severe acute malnutrition. Their stories reflect both the urgency of the challenge and the impact of timely intervention.

In Hausari Community, Kori Ward, Machina Local Government Area, volunteers met 13-month-old Saude Auwalu during a door-to-door screening exercise. A simple mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) measurement revealed a reading of 10.9 cm, confirming severe acute malnutrition. Saude was immediately referred to a Primary Health Care Centre for appropriate medical and nutritional care.

Beyond referral, her mother, Mallama Hauwa, was supported through a Healthy Cooking Demonstration, where she learned practical skills on appropriate complementary feeding using locally available and affordable food items. With consistent care and improved feeding practices at home, Saude's nutritional status improved. Her MUAC measurement increased to 12.0 cm, showing progress from severe to moderate acute malnutrition and renewed hope for a healthier future.

A similar moment of intervention unfolded in Kangarwa Community, Maskandare Ward, Machina Local Government Area, where Failata Haruna, a 30-year-old mother, had been struggling as her child fell sick repeatedly. Even after spending what little the family could afford on medications, the child's condition continued to worsen.

During the screening, her child was identified with severe acute malnutrition and was immediately enrolled for treatment under the project. He was placed on ready-to-use therapeutic food, and within a short period, his recovery became visibly evident.

"The improvement was so fast and clear that I could hardly believe it," Failata shared. "It was almost like magic."

In Rikiyan Kandili, Kankare Community, 14-month-old Hauwa Ahmed was identified during a community screening with a MUAC measurement of 10.7 cm, indicating severe acute malnutrition. Following her identification, her mother, Fatima Muhammad, received guidance on appropriate complementary feeding using locally available foods.

By applying the knowledge gained, Fatima consistently provided improved nutrition to her child at home. During follow-up monitoring, Hauwa was re-measured and her MUAC had increased to 12.0 cm, reflecting a clear improvement in her nutritional status. Today, Hauwa is healthier, more active, and fully on the path to recovery.

Just a short distance away in Alaisharu Community, Kolori Ward, 23-month-old Fatima Abdullahi was also identified during a house-to-house screening. Her MUAC measurement of 11.4 cm confirmed severe acute malnutrition. She was promptly referred to an Outpatient Therapeutic Programme (OTP) centre, where she was admitted and placed on ready-to-use therapeutic food.

After five months of consistent treatment, monitoring, and follow-up, Fatima's condition improved to moderate acute malnutrition. She was further supported with corn-soya blend plus to strengthen her recovery. With continued nutritional support, she has now fully recovered and returned to a normal nutritional status.

Her mother, Zara Muhd, expressed deep appreciation for the project and the volunteers, thanking them for their dedication and for going house to house to identify children in need. She noted that without such outreach, many children would continue to suffer silently.

Together, these four stories spanning multiple communities and local government areas demonstrate the life-saving power of early detection, community-based screening, caregiver education, and sustained nutritional support. Through the Malnutrition Emergency Appeal Project, the Nigerian Red Cross Society is not only treating malnutrition but restoring health, dignity, and hope one child, one family, and one community at a time.

SERVING HUMANITY, SAFELY: STRENGTHENING VOLUNTEER COURAGE IN DELTA STATE

Behind every humanitarian action is a volunteer willing to serve often in challenging and uncertain environments. Recognizing that safety is the foundation of effective service, the Nigerian Red Cross Society (NRCS), Delta State Branch, with support from the British Red Cross, concluded a two-day Safer Access Framework (SAF) Training.

The training equipped volunteers with practical tools to navigate risks, build community trust, and deliver aid safely, while remaining true to the values and principles of the Red Cross Movement. Sessions covered the history and protective role of the Red Cross emblem, SAF essentials, risk-aware operations, volunteer identification, communication strategies, and operational security tailored to Delta State's realities.

Through interactive group work, case studies, and presentations, participants strengthened teamwork and reinforced the shared responsibility of safety in humanitarian service.

The training was facilitated by Col. Gabriel Udoenang (Rtd), NRCS Security Coordinator, and Mr. Andronicus Adeyemo, Director, SAF, WEC, whose expertise enriched the learning experience.

Commending the initiative, Delta State Branch Chairman, Adolphus Anuagasi, described the training as a vital step in building volunteers' confidence, safety, courage, and capacity to save lives while upholding the Red Cross mission.

WHEN CLIMATE CHANGE FEELS CLOSE TO HOME

Climate change is no longer a distant concern. It is felt in homes where the heat lingers longer than expected, in hostels where waste piles up, and in open spaces where pollution quietly impacts daily life. The harmattan that once bit sharply now passes quickly, replaced by heavier heat and a changing environment.

Amid this reality, everyday climate heroes are emerging through the work of the Nigerian Red Cross Society, Oyo State College of Health Technology Detachment. Their efforts remind the community that climate change is not only about the environment, it directly affects human health, safety, and dignity.

Through practical demonstrations and relatable conversations, Red Cross volunteers highlighted how rising temperatures can cause heat stress, dehydration, and fainting. They showed simple first aid techniques that can save lives in everyday situations, proving that awareness can be a powerful form of protection.

The detachment also focused messages on environmental responsibility where staff and students were encouraged to tackle pollution and poor waste disposal, recognizing that small actions, like proper waste management and cleanliness, build healthier, more resilient communities.



What stood out most was the engagement of the school community. Participants listened, reflected, and shared ideas on how personal habits affect the environment. Some were inspired to take the next step, joining humanitarian efforts and embracing daily practices that respond to the silent crisis of climate change.

Through the Nigerian Red Cross Society, Oyo State College of Health Technology Detachment, the message is clear: climate change may be global, but action starts locally.

Every small step protecting life, dignity, and the environment counts. These are the heroes quietly shaping a safer, more resilient future, one community at a time.

MEASLES RUBELLA VACCINATION CAMPAIGN ACROSS STATES



The Nigerian Red Cross Society supported the implementation of Measles-Rubella vaccine campaign in Lagos, Rivers, Edo and Ekiti States. The campaign which had our volunteers engaging with community members at strategic locations was in collaboration with the Primary Health Care and Ministry of Health across the implementing states.

The exercise focused on educating market women, parents, and the general public on the dangers of measles and rubella, the importance of vaccination, and the forthcoming statewide immunization campaign scheduled for 27th January to 7th February 2026, targeting children aged 9 months to 14 years across LGAs across the states.



In the busy markets of Edo State, Red Cross volunteers engaged market women on the dangers of measles and rubella and the importance of timely vaccination. Through simple conversations at their stalls, parents were reminded that protecting children starts with prevention.

Volunteers of the Ekiti State Branch, Ijero Division, took interpersonal communication straight to the homes of caregivers across Ikoro-Ekiti, having open conversations around vaccine hesitancy and child health. By meeting families where they are, concerns were addressed, trust was built, and more caregivers were encouraged to choose protection for their children.



After a focused RCCE training for the measles-rubella campaign in Lagos, Red Cross volunteers came together, better equipped to engage communities with clear, respectful messages on vaccination. The session strengthened their confidence to listen, respond to concerns, and support families to make informed choices for child health.

STRENGTHENING CARE THROUGH SAFER HANDS

In a shared commitment to quality healthcare and staff wellbeing, the Kano State Hospital Management Board, in collaboration with the Nigerian Red Cross Society (NRCS), Kano State Branch, organized a one-day Manual Handling Training for staff of Murtala Muhammad Specialist Hospital (MMSH), Kano.

Held with a strong focus on the Accident and Emergency (A&E) Unit, the training was designed to enhance practical skills, encourage teamwork, and reduce the risk of workplace injuries associated with patient handling. Through guided sessions and hands-on demonstrations, participants gained renewed confidence in safe movement techniques that protect both healthcare workers and the patients in their care. Beyond physical safety, the training also fostered improved morale and

a deeper sense of collaboration among staff. By strengthening their capacity to respond effectively in high-pressure situations, healthcare workers are better equipped to provide care that is not only efficient but also compassionate and dignified.

This initiative reflects the NRCS's ongoing commitment to supporting healthcare systems through capacity building and lifesaving knowledge. By investing in the safety, confidence, and skills of frontline health workers, the programme contributes directly to improved patient outcomes and a safer, more resilient Accident and Emergency Unit.



TURNING ADVOCACY INTO OPPORTUNITY

Sometimes, real change begins not with noise, but with the right conversation at the right table. Through deliberate and strategic advocacy, the Nigerian Red Cross Society, Kaduna State Branch, has secured a landmark partnership with the Kaduna State Senior Secondary Education Board (KADSSEB), reopening the doors of public secondary schools to Red Cross units across the state.



It is a quiet but powerful victory, one that places humanitarian values back at the heart of education and gives thousands of young people the chance to learn, lead, and serve. When the Red Cross leadership, led by Branch Chairman Alhaji Abdullahi Jibril, met with the KADSSEB Chairperson, Dr. Suweiba Shehu Ibrahim, advocacy met opportunity. Beyond policy discussions, there was shared history. Dr. Suweiba reflected on her own days as a Red Cross member in school and the lifelong impact of service, empathy, and responsibility. What followed was not just agreement, but alignment.



Years of policy shifts had seen many school-based Red Cross clubs quietly disappear. This engagement reversed that trend. With KADSSEB's commitment to restoring Red Cross units, strengthening policy support, and encouraging collaboration between teachers and students, advocacy translated directly into action—and into permanence.

For Kaduna's students, the impact goes far beyond an after-school activity. It means access to lifesaving skills, leadership opportunities, and early exposure to the principles of humanity, neutrality, and service. More importantly, it shows how thoughtful engagement with decision-makers can create lasting systems, not temporary projects.



This partnership stands as a reminder that when advocacy is intentional and relationships are nurtured, change becomes sustainable. In KADSSEB, the Red Cross has found not just a partner, but a champion, proof that investing in young people through strategic advocacy is one of the strongest foundations for a more humane future.
